Dear Brothers and Sisters,

As promised in our letter of March 11, 2020, we continue to monitor the changing conditions related to COVID-19 throughout the world. Where possible, leaders should conduct any essential leadership meetings via technology. Specific questions may be referred to local priesthood leaders. Further direction related to other matters will be provided.

Bishops should counsel with their stake president to determine how to make the sacrament available to members at least once a month.

We encourage members in their ministering efforts to care for one other. We should follow the Savior's example to bless and lift others.

We bear our witness of the Lord's love during this time of uncertainty. He will bless you to find joy as you do your best to live the gospel of Jesus Christ in every circumstance.

A letter from Bishop Ekker:

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I wanted to make sure each of you received information concerning the changes that have been made in response to the developing COVID-19 situation. Attached to this email is the statement released yesterday by the First Presidency and Quorum of the Twelve Apostles regarding the suspension of all public gatherings of church members, including sacrament meeting. In addition, I have attached an official notice from the Westbrook Stake Presidency with additional instructions.

I have had several members comment to me on the timeliness of the recent changes in the church to a more home-centered and church-supported program. I bear you my witness that these changes have been inspired. In Doctrine and Covenants 1:17 the Lord himself declared: "Wherefore, I the Lord, knowing the calamity which should come upon the inhabitants of the earth, called upon my servant Joseph Smith, Jun., and spake unto him from heaven, and gave him commandments."

Elder Gary E Stevensen, of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles, further explained in his last conference talk: "We might say that the Lord, who knows 'the end from the beginning,' knows the unique difficulties of our day. . . . The way is simple. Through His servants, God speaks to us, His children, and gives us commandments. We could restate the verse I just quoted to say, 'I the Lord ... called upon my servant [President Russell M. Nelson], and spake unto him from heaven, and gave him commandments.' Isn't that a glorious truth? . . . I marvel at the goodness and compassion of a loving Heavenly Father and His Son, Jesus Christ, who restored the Savior's Church to earth once again and have called a prophet in our day. The Restoration of the gospel of Jesus Christ offsets periloustimes with the fulness of times."

The Lord loves us, and as we seek and follow His counsel given to us by our Prophet and leaders we will be blessed and need not fear.

I am emailing to express our love for you as members of our ward. Please know that you are in our thoughts and prayers daily. We hope that you are able to enjoy the blessings and hope that the gospel brings while we are apart.

One of the key points of the gospel and where we can find hope is in making and keeping covenants with the Lord. Renewing our commitment to those covenants regularly is vital to our progression and happiness.

The method the Savior established for this is the ordinance of the Sacrament. Worthily partaking of the Sacrament brings us renewal and provides us spiritual power in our efforts to repent and get through the trials of life. I am so grateful for this sacred ordinance!

We are happy to arrange for it no matter your household circumstances.

Within guidelines provided by the Area Presidency and in counsel with his bishops, each stake president will determine the specific timing for resuming ward and stake meetings and activities.

June 7 – Bishopric Sacrament meeting schedule:

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

We are excited to share further details of our plans to return back to our Sunday worship services. We know there is strength in worshipping together and we are grateful for the opportunity to see each of you. At this time, we have received authorization from the First Presidency, our Area Presidency, and our Stake Presidency to resume monthly Sacrament Meetings in small groups.

Please note there is no requirement to attend an in-person meeting for those of you in high-risk groups or for those who are simply uncomfortable attending group gatherings at this time. If you choose not to participate at this time in these gatherings, you will continue to have the authorization to administer the sacrament (or to have the sacrament administered) in your home setting each week. If you need assistance with sacrament administration in your home, please contact a member of the Bishopric, Elders Quorum Presidency or Relief Society Presidency so it can be arranged.

Under our approved stake plan, each of the units that occupy the stake center (5th Ward, 8th Ward, 9th Ward, and 10th Branch) will have an assigned Sunday each month to occupy the building. **The 5th Ward has been approved to begin our monthly meetings next Sunday, June 14th**, and we will meet once a month on the 2nd Sunday of the month until further notice. We will have **two 50 minute sacrament meetings on our assigned Sunday**, and each meeting may be presided over by a different member of the bishopric. This plan allows each member the opportunity at least once per month for all who wish to attend and receive the ordinance of the sacrament at the prescribed meeting time for their group.

Sacrament Meeting Guidelines

In order to make our worship services safe and comfortable, we have put together some additional guidelines listed below outlining the precautions we are asking all those attending to follow. We encourage you to read and discuss these guidelines with your family.

- 1. Remember Sacrament Meeting attendance is strictly voluntary. If you are uncomfortable, at high
 - risk or not feeling well, please stay at home.
- 2. All members are encouraged to wear protective masks. Bottles of hand sanitizer will be available in the building for your use.

Strive to maintain the 6-foot distance from others while entering, exiting and moving about the building. Also strive to maintain appropriate distance when seated by those who are not part of the same family group or living in the same home.

Members should enter the building through the south side foyer. Members who require parking for individuals with disabilities may park on the west side of the building and may enter through the west door by the stake offices.

In order to practice safe social distancing, signs will be attached to the pews to show where members can sit. Seating in the chapel will be done in a way to have an empty pew between occupied ones for the safe and orderly passing of the sacrament. Chairs will also be set up in the overflow for families to sit together. Ushers will be present to assist in finding seating if needed.

Since chairs and other seating will be arranged according to safe distancing guidelines, members may remove their masks while seated. However, we encourage members to wear protective masks when moving about within the church building.

The Aaronic/Melchizedek priesthood brethren will be given special training in preparing and passing the Sacrament. We encourage parents with smaller children to assist in handling the emblems of bread and water for their children.

8. While in the chapel and overflow, please prevent smaller children from straying to other areas and to other families.

Please do not congregate in the parking lot or building before/after meetings. Please be mindful that other groups may be exiting or entering the parking lot and building in close proximity to your arrival and departure and we desire to protect each other. Your courtesy in allowing others to exit prior to your entrance will be appreciated.

Since we will be cleaning high touch points throughout the church between meetings, we ask that you vacate the church promptly after the meeting concludes to allow ample time to complete this process prior to the start of the next meeting

We encourage you to bring your own digital hymnbook as printed hymnals will not be available.

We are so excited to be able to gather again as a ward family in our worship, and are pleased with the positive developments in our recovery from the pandemic. May the Lord's blessings continue to be upon you, your family, and our ward family.

Beginning in November, when assigned by the President of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles and as circumstances and technology allow, stake conferences may be held virtually or with careful social distancing, as appropriate.

We are grateful for inspired patterns of ministering and home-centered Church-supported efforts that allow the Lord's work to move forward in current conditions.

September 25 – Meeting House Technology:

The First Presidency letter dated September 11, 2020, "Safely Engaging in Church Meetings and Activities," outlines principles and details to help leaders adjust Church meetings and activities due to COVID-19, whether in person or through technology. The following guidelines are provided to help local units make decisions about the use of technology for these meetings and activities.

- Ensure that technology does not become a distraction. For sacrament meetings, a one-way streaming solution will avoid inadvertent interruptions that could be caused by those participating remotely. For class, quorum, and other meetings, an interactive two-way solution will support effective teaching.
- Choose technology that will be easy for remote participants to use. Whenever possible, take care to avoid choices that would exclude someone from worshipping due to resource constraints or technology complexities.
- Preserve flexibility by avoiding significant equipment purchases and permanent meetinghouse modifications. This can be done by focusing on simple solutions that can be adapted as needs, policies, conditions, and technologies evolve.
- Call one or more assistant technology specialists for each unit, and ensure that they have adequate training and support. To have access to the Webcast platform that is installed in some meetinghouses, a person's calling must be recorded in Leader and Clerk Resources (LCR) as a 'stake assistant technology specialist.'

Additional details on selecting and using technology are in the enclosure to this notice and on the Church's technology forum, tech.ChurchofJesusChrist.org/forum. This forum will be used to share ideas and provide current best practices.

September 26 – Sacrament meeting in-person meetings:

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Just a final reminder that weekly sacrament meetings will resume *tomorrow* at 9:00 am. We invite individuals and families who are

able to gather in-person to join us at this time. Our ward will only hold one sacrament meeting per week, with a maximum attendance of 150. We will still follow the recommended guidelines that have been in place for the last three months. For more information on those guidelines, click here.

In addition to gathering for sacrament meeting in-person, we will broadcast that meeting each week for members and families who are at high risk, not feeling well, or uncomfortable attending. These broadcasts will be presented live online, and will not be recorded to view later. The link to join the broadcast

The sacrament meeting format will be changed slightly to allow for the sacrament to be administered both at the chapel and at the homes of members worshipping remotely. Opening and closing musical numbers and prayers will be offered, and one to two speakers (or member testimonies on Fast Sunday) will occur from 9:00 to 9:30 am. As this portion of the meeting concludes, the broadcast will end and members attending at the chapel will have a sacrament hymn followed by the administration of the sacrament. Following the sacrament, the meeting will end. Likewise, families participating from home are encouraged to administer the sacrament immediately after the broadcast concludes. Members should be finished with both the meeting and sacrament by 9:45 am

In addition to weekly sacrament meetings, classes for youth and adult organizations and quorums will be held remotely beginning Sunday, October 11. Additional information and instruction about the time and accessibility of these classes will be announced soon.


773 people in Utah have died of COVID-19.





Organizational Histories

Elder's quorum history for 2020

When we were finally able to meet in person again, attendance picked up for those activities (especially those combined with the young men), but in-person meetings still weren't the norm. Our class presidents and some members of their presidencies were stalwart and always present, but we still worried about losing girls.

Overall, 2020 was difficult because of that, but it also brought out some amazing qualities in the girls that stayed strong and consistently participated. We're hoping to move forward with enthusiasm in 2021!
